In 2023, diesel pollution in New Jersey is estimated to have caused nearly \$3.8 billion in monetized health damages, including more than 300 lives lost.

If the Advanced Clean Trucks (ACT) policy is delayed, New Jersey will face up to 24 premature deaths and up to \$373 million in additional healthcare costs.



Pending legislation (\$3817/A4967) to rollback ACT implementation, effective in January 2025, threatens progress towards clean air for all residents of our state.



Exposure to diesel exhaust leads to premature deaths, respiratory diseases, and cardiovascular issues, concentrated in communities near major transit routes and industrial areas.



Cars and trucks are the largest contributor to air pollution in New Jersey, which has more highways per square mile than any other state in the U.S.



Toxic emissions from trucks continue flooding the lungs of residents, with lowincome and communities of color bearing the brunt of air pollution.

New Jersey's ACT policy primes the state to achieve environmental justice and charge forward toward a cleaner, healthier, more equitable future.
